STRAW, JOHN

Mary, widow

April 30, 1818 John Straw of New Chester, Grafton County, New Hampshire, sixty-two years of age, deposed: that he enlisted in March 1777 for three years under Capt. D. Livermore, Third New Hampshire Regiment and served until March 20, 1780 when, his time having expired, he was discharged.

(The discharge certificate of John Straw, Third New Hampshire Regiment, having served three years, signed Daniel Livermore, "Captain Commanding Third New Hampshire regiment" dated Camp Danbury, March 20, 1780, is on file in the Department. BMD.)

April 30, 1818 Samuel Hoyt, one of the Selectmen of New Chester, N.H.,

and May 4, 1818 W.W.Sargent another Selectman of the same town certified to John Straw's need of a pension.

Claim allowed.

Nothing on file to indicate that John Straw ever applied under Act of May 1, 1820, so his name was stricken from the roll on account of property.

September 24, 1834 Mary Straw of Hill, Grafton County, N.H., seventy-seven years of age, deposed:

that she is the widow of John Straw, Revolutionary Pensioner in 1818, to whom she was married at Concord, N.H., August 17, 1780;

and that her husband died March 25, 1823.

August 28, 1838 Mary Dimond of Warner, N.H., sixty-eight years of age, deposed:

that she was personally acquainted with John Straw "a young man who lived with my father in 1780 or thereabout; and was also acquainted with Mary Emerson, a young woman, a cousin of mine, who lived with my father at the same time";

that they were married in August 1780, as nearly as she can recollect, and "had the wedding at my father's house."

August 28, 1838 the Town Clerk of Concord, N.H., certified that the intention of marriage between John Straw and Mary Emerson, August 7, 1780 is recorded on the book of Publishments, at Concord, N.H.;

that no marriages were recorded on the town books of Concord, from 1778 to 1783.

August 27, 1838 Moses Straw of Hill, N.H., testified that he is a son of John Straw, Revolutionary Pensioner, who "died at my house in Hill";

and that his mother Mary Straw, has lived with him ever since the death of John Straw.

Claim allowed as was her subsequent claim, made March 22, 1843 still being a resident of Hill, eighty-two years of age, and the last Certificate was 1628 New Hampshire Agency, issued August 30, 1843 under Act of March 3, 1843.
